Safe Summer Greetings To All

I am Gary Ladin, the Sector Lieutenant with the Richmond Police Department. One of the areas that I am responsible for is Historic Jackson Ward.

I have been in this position since July, 2006. Prior to that, I was in charge of our Criminal Intelligence Division which included Homeland Security, SWAT, Bombs, Negotiators, Medics, Planes, Command Centers and several other units.

I was born in the city and now live in the house I grew up in. Thus I share an interest with all of you in making our city an attractive place that is safe to live, work and visit.

We have had many recent successes in Jackson Ward. Based on your requests at last year's Sector Training, we were asked to address the robberies in and around Abner Clay Park. The result of this effort was zero robberies in that area for the period of this plan!

I have dedicated several of my resources on a regular basis to Jackson Ward. We have had the Mounted Unit, Bike Officers, Walking Officers, Light and Speed Trailers deployed into the area. Based on complaints from residents, we have executed several search warrants which

turned up narcotics, weapons and wanted people. So far this year, violent crime is down 23% and property crimes down 6% for HJW.

We have met with two groups who are interested in maintaining a Neighborhood Watch. I would like to see this grow. We will be glad to assist any of you with forming such a group for your block(s).

We just had our second Sector Training event. Several members of your community attended. We are going to craft our action plan based on your requests to address alcohol-related issues. Issues like drinking in public, littering and panhandling will be included. We will also look at the homeless situation, blighted properties and other social issues of concern.

With your help, we will continue our efforts to keep Jackson Ward a safe place to live, work and visit. It is truly an honor and pleasure to serve your community. As always, please let me know if there is anything that I can assist you with.

Stroll along Jackson Street today and head up 1st to Clay and down 2nd street to Leigh and you will see a diversified population. All cultures and ages with a variety of income levels thrive in this neighborhood."
- "All abandoned properties either restored or eliminated to create additional green space in the neighborhood. Restoration of the OIC building to current proposed use as affordable senior housing so that those in the neighborhood who can't afford

to keep their homes can still live in the neighborhood..."

What a day Saturday April 21. 2007 turned out to be for our Jackson Ward Community. Thank you so much for coming out to clean up and beautify our wonderful neighborhood. Through a concerted group effort, our neighborhood once again looks fantastic. We had 26 Jackson Ward residents along with 10 volunteers from Adult Career Development C, Capital One, Philip Morris, Biotech, and RRHA that participated in our Clean-Up / Beautification Day. And, after the official Clean-Up was over, Officer Jim Woo of the Richmond Police Department brought out his two-man crew to take care of Duval Street. As always, a special thanks to Richmond City for the use of a manned truck, garbage bags and litter sticks.

It's important to note what Kyle Wittenborn, who was on the "Alley Crew", noticed --that the alleys were "so much cleaner than they've been in the past". Our last Clean-Up Day was over six months ago, which means that our past efforts have made a difference in the mindset of the community as a whole. People are not dumping as much trash, neighbors are picking up trash on their own, and individuals are showing appreciation for the upkeep of the area on a daily basis. This is very exciting!

While you are strolling our clean city streets, take notice of Abner Clay Park, especially the fenced in area that borders on Clay Street. It's inspirational to see what good planning, a lot of weeding, 20 bags of mulch and

some muscle can do to improve the look of an area.

What was the end result of our clean-up day? For our efforts, 2 appliances, 5 tires, and 78 bags of trash were collected. That's 78 huge orange bags of trash that is no longer littering our streets or blowing around our neighborhood. Jackson Ward Gateway Sign Project Under Way


This past fall we were fortunate enough to receive a \$40,000 grant from Philip Morris to develop neighborhood gateway signs. There was an attempt to get this project going about six years ago, but the project was more complicated and expensive than expected The signs will mark the perimeter of the neighborhood and let people passing through know who we are and where they are. The city needs to approve installation followed by details like insurance and landscaping. Now that we have the grant from Philip Morris, it is possible to bring in professional assistance to get the project underway.

Cornerstone Architects has been hired to manage the planning and design of the sign locations within the neighborhood. They have been tasked to review the following high profile locations...

- 1. Adams & Broad
- 2. Marshall & Belvidere
- 3. Leigh & Belvidere
- 4. 3rd & Jackson

Each area will be measured and photographed followed by site plans that will go to the city for approval. Pending approval by the city, Cornerstone will then work to assist with design, fabrication and installation costs within our budget. If all goes well, we could see installation of new signs this fall. There is still a lot of work to be done, so it is still too early to determine how many signs we can get from the \$40,000 and which location will be approved by the city. The design will also need to be submitted to The Commission of Architectural Review for historical appropriateness. Stay tuned to future newsletters or attend the monthly Jackson Ward meetings for updates.

Happy One Year Anniversary City Lights!

Happy Anniversary City Lights!

On April 18, 2006, Capital One launched the City Lights initiative in partnership with The Adult Career Development Center(ACDC), Black History Museum & Cultural Center of Virginia (BHM), Historic Jackson Ward Association (HJWA), Richmond Redevelopment & Housing Authority (RRHA), and Technology Resource Connections (TRC). Through this partnership, Capital One has committed \$1.5million over a three-year period to the revitalization of the Jackson Ward community with emphasis on affordable housing, educational opportunities, economic development, neighborhood safety and neighborhood appeal. Through collaboration, the partners have benefited from working together to achieve great results. For example, a representative from ACDC now sits on the HJWA board, TRC has been able to take advantage of work space at ACDC, RRHA gained support from the HJWA in identifying and citing homes in need of repair, and the BHM utilized a student from the ACDC work study program to assist with museum activities. All of the partners played a role in the City Lights booth that was kicked off at the 2006 2nd Street Festival. The purpose of the booth was to create awareness of the partnership and share information about the partners with the public. The booth was a great success with introduction of a cyber café and

various giveaways. More than 1,000 visitors stopped by to check us out! In addition to these examples of shared resources, here is a brief recap of just a few of the accomplishments of the past twelve months:

Adult Career Development Center - Through the development of a work study program, 12 students learned valuable skills regarding interviewing techniques, resume writing and financial education. More than 250 Capital One volunteers participated in these activities.

Black History Museum & Cultural Center of Virginia- After the successful opening of the Barnstormin' exhibit which showcased the Negro Baseball League, the museum experienced a successful run with an exhibition by renowned photographer Chester Higgins. With the support of Capital One, the museum is now able to provide full operating hours Tuesday -Saturday.

Historic Jackson Ward Association-By expanding the neighborhood's holiday party to include City Lights partners, we created the opportunity to invite key community members and build awareness of the work being done through the partnership. Neighborhood clean up days how have volunteers from the City Lights partner organizations to support the community in these efforts. The association also provided volunteers to serve as "neighborhood" ambassadors" during the 2006 2nd Street Festival.

Richmond Redevelopment & Housing Authority-To support our efforts to provide affordable housing, RRHA finalized the purchase of 308 W Leigh Street for stabilization and resale. Additionally, twenty-five other homes in Jackson Ward have been impacted due to citations being issued as initiated by the housing authority.

Technology Resource Connections-In the fall of 2006, TRC launched its Microsoft Office training classes and provided discounts to Jackson Ward residents.

In 2007, the City Lights partners will continue on the trajectory started last year. Each organization has robust plans for individual activities such as expanding the work study program at ACDC, a 25th Anniversary Celebration at the BHM, purchase of additional homes for stabilization through RRHA, small business technology assistance through TRC, and community projects through the HJWA. We are thrilled that we will have a Rebuilding Together event in the fall to revitalize four homes in the community for elderly/disabled residents. So to all of our partners-Happy Anniversary!







Curated Culture's First Fri*days* is patterned after Europe's successful "art walks", now a part of city life worldwide. Like Richmond's, similar programs across the United States have helped promote local arts and culture while revitalizing urban neighborhoods. Richmond's Downtown Arts District and its burgeoning Gallery Row on Broad St are located between Historic Jackson (north) and Monroe Ward (south), Richmond's hottest growing area. It lies west of the Downtown Business District and east of Belvidere St and the Virginia Commonwealth University (VCU) campus.

First Fridays generally takes place between 6:00-10:00 p.m. on the first Friday of each month. The public attends various FREE art exhibitions at participating galleries and alternative exhibition spaces within walking distance of the Historic Broad Street District.
